## $\mathbf{2 0 1 7}$ Preliminary Advanced Placement Results Brief

This brief reviews the preliminary Advanced Placement (AP) data from the 2016-2017 school year at TC Williams High School. Included in the brief is this one page narrative along with a table (see reverse page) which provides a summary display of key AP test results, along with eleven comparison years dating back to 2005. All 2017 statistics came from the College Board's data released on July 17, 2017.

Since its inception in 1955, the Advanced Placement program has provided motivated high school students with the opportunity to take college-level courses in a high school setting. Students who participate in the program not only gain college-level skills, but in many cases they also earn college credit while they are still in high school. It should be noted that beginning in the 2004-2005 school year, ACPS instituted a policy (Board policy IGBI) requiring students who took an AP course to also take the corresponding AP examination with all associated costs paid for by ACPS.

## Preliminary Results

A total of 858 ACPS students took 1,799 Advanced Placement (AP) Subject Tests in the spring of 2017. The 858 students who took at least one AP test in 2017 represented a $10 \%$ increase $(\mathrm{n}=78)$ from the 2016. When considering the overall student enrollment, one-third of students in grades 10-12 took at least one AP test in 2017. In regards to the number of AP tests taken, more tests were taken in $2017(\mathrm{n}=1,799)$ compared with those taken in $2016(\mathrm{n}=1,702)$.

AP tests were scored on a five-point scale; the College Board required a score of " 3 " or greater to recommend a student for college credit or advanced placement. The College Board awarded scores of " 3 " or greater to $61 \%$ of the AP tests taken by ACPS students in 2017, up four percentage points from 2016 ( $57 \%$ ) and 22 percentage points higher than the 2005 total (see Table 1). The proportion of scores of " 5 " earned ( $16 \%$ ) was two percentage points greater than last year's results and the highest percentage of " 5 's" earned since 2005.

As an index of "Equity and Excellence," the College Board reported the number of students successful on AP tests as a percentage of the graduating class. Successful students included all twelfth graders who earned an AP score of " 3 " or greater at any time in their high school years. For 2017, $37 \%$ of the ACPS graduating class earned " 3 " or greater on an AP test at some point during their high school career, representing an increase of 17 percentage points since 2005 (see Table 1).

Compared to spring 2016, there was an increase in both AP participation and performance in spring 2017. There was a two percentage point increase in the proportion of students who took an AP exam and a four percentage point increase in the proportion of scores earning a score of ' 3 ' or greater compared to 2015-16 results. The proportion of students earning the highest AP score of ' 5 ' was the highest percentage of " 5 's" earned since 2005.
