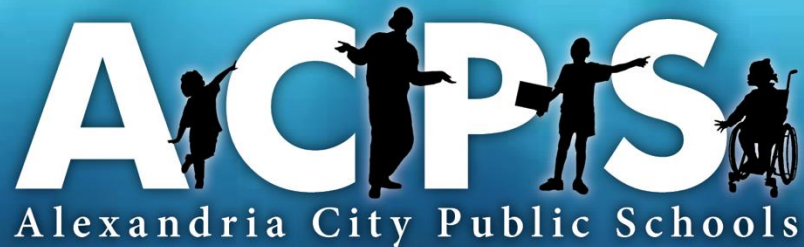

Overview

The School Nutrition Program is a self supporting department operating within the school system. The program mission is to meet the nutritional needs of all students as well as offer a good meal value for students and adults.

Our program is made up of a team of nearly 110 food and nutrition professionals (to include substitutes) preparing healthy, nutritious meals at 17 school cafeterias in addition to providing meals to students at offsite programs (Chance for Change, NELL, and Satellite). Each meal meets the federal guidelines for types and amounts of food offered.

We participate in the National School Lunch and Breakfast Program offering Free and Reduced Price Meals to qualifying families. During the 16/17 SY, 62.22% of the student population qualified for Free or Reduced Price Meals as opposed to 15/16 which was 61%.

All program expenses (food, supplies, equipment replacement and repair, labor, benefits and contracted services) are paid for by program revenues.

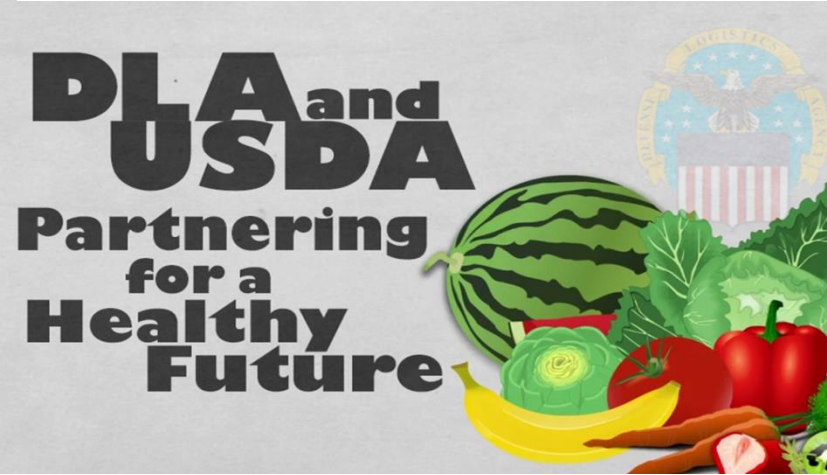

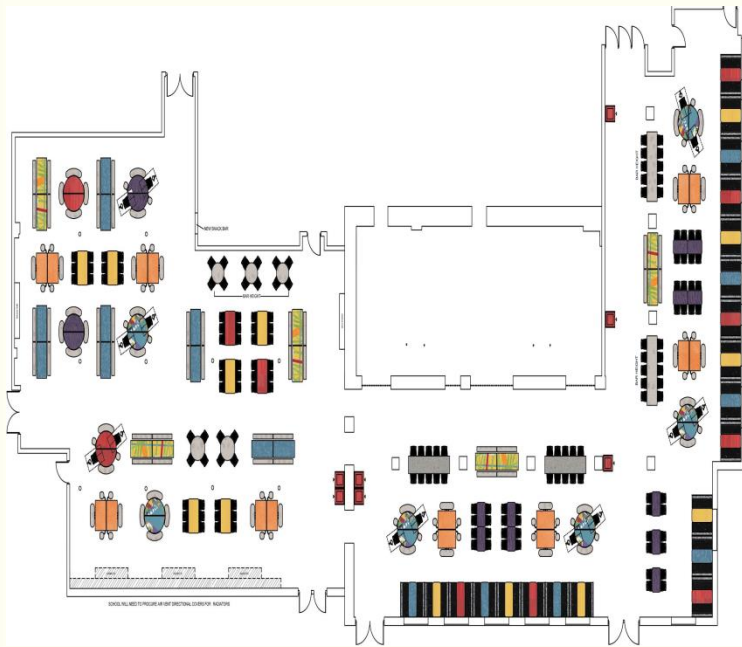
SNS Financial

- Fiscally Sound
 - All program expenses (food, supplies, equipment replacement and repair, labor, benefits and contracted services) are paid for by program revenues.
- Program Threats
 - COSTS: ~\$15,000/day for non make-up attendance days (Snow days)
 - Loss: ~ 50,000/annually Jeff Houston
