Old Business & Action Items

22. Authorization of Collective Bargaining

Dr. Rief gave an overview of the Collective Bargaining process to date. In October, the Board received a Certification of Support from EAA indicating that the majority of licensed personnel supported collective bargaining in ACPS. The 120-day deadline to consider adopting a resolution to authorize collective bargaining in ACPS is February 13, 2024. Therefore, the Board must vote on the Resolution to Authorize Collective Bargaining at this meeting.

Dr. Simpson Baird read the proposed resolution for the Authorization of Collective Bargaining in ACPS and moved to adopt the resolution.

Vice Chair Booz seconded the motion.

The vote to adopt the Authorization of Collective Bargaining Resolution was unanimous, 9-0. The motion carried.

The School Board will have 60 days to adopt a Collective Bargaining Resolution. A draft resolution will be presented at the February 22, 2024 School Board Meeting, followed by a Public Hearing on February 29th, a Work Session on March 14th, and a vote on the Collective Bargaining Resolution at the March 21, 2024 School Board Meeting.

New Business and Reports to the Board

23. FY 2023 Annual Comprehensive Financial Report

Mr. Michael Covington, Director of Accounting, introduced the FY 2023 Annual Comprehensive Financial Report (ACFR) on financial activities that occurred in ACPS for FY 2023. Mr. Remi Omisore, CPA, Principal at CliftonLarsonAllen auditors, reviewed the auditor's report, and indicated that ACPS received an "unmodified" or "clean" opinion indicating that the financial statements fairly represented the financial position of ACPS as of June 20, 2023.

Mr. Beaty moved to accept the FY 2023 Annual Comprehensive Financial Report.

Mr. Harris seconded the motion.

The vote to accept the FY 2023 Annual Comprehensive Financial Report was unanimous, 9-0. The motion carried.

24. Policy Revision

Mr. Matt Smith, Policy Consultant, presented policy and regulation revisions recommended by staff. The revisions include code changes, code alignment and VSBA model policy alignment, were audited for equity, edited by a team of staff members, and reviewed by the SLT and the Board Policy Subcommittee.

The following policies and regulations were presented for revision:

These revisions are proposed for adoption at a future School Board Meeting.

25. FY 2024 Capital Improvement Program (CIP) Quarterly Report for Q2

Mr. John Finnigan, Director of Educational Facilities, presented the FY 2024 Q2 Quarterly Report which contained a summary of the Capital Improvement Program work that progressed during the second quarter of FY 2024 (October - December 2023). The highest percentage of the work noted was in the implementation phase (21 projects). The remainder of the projects were in the planning/design phase (15), pending close-out phase, and close-out phase (2).

Dr. Simpson Baird moved to accept the CIP Quarterly Report for FY2024 Q2.

Ms. Greene seconded the motion.

The vote to accept the CIP Quarterly Report for FY 2024 Q2 was 8-0. Mr. Elnoubi abstained. The motion carried.

26. CIP Quarterly Reserve Report, FY 24 Q2

On December 7, 2017, the School Board authorized the establishment of a Capital Improvement Program (CIP) Reserve Account which provides an additional option for CIP budget transfers. This reserve account allows the School Board to move budgeted funds between capital accounts using a two-step process. The CIP Reserve Account balance remains unchanged at \$235,759.77.

The vote to approve moving into a closed session was unanimous, 9-0. The motion carried.

Ms. Greene seconded the motion.

The vote was unanimous, 9-0, to certify the Closed Meeting. The motion carried.
